
## **Visitor Parking Guide**

- Permits are virtual, no physical permit, your tag is your permit
- No Pull Through/No Back In on campus
- Permitted to park in visitor, reserved, staff, student, timed for posted time, metered must pay

All visitors to campus are encouraged to obtain a virtual visitor permit from the Parking & Transportation Department or University Police Department before parking on campus. All motorized vehicles on campus must be registered during the week days (Monday – Friday). Designated visitor spaces are marked throughout the university; however, visitors with a permit are also allowed to park in the following areas: reserved, staff, employee lots, student or timed (for the allotted time) spaces on campus. No parking allowed in Service Ve-hicle Spaces, 24 hour reserved, tow zones, curbs and disabled spaces (unless the appropriate state permit is displayed). Daily permits are free of charge. Semester permits are \$25.00 and can be purchased inside of the Parking & Transportation Department. Visitors may also pay to park in metered parking lots. No virtual permit is needed for the metered parking lots.

Weekend Parking (Friday after 5:00PM, Saturday and Sunday – No Permit Required). If a visitor receives a parking citation for no parking permit during the week, they should immediately notify the Parking & Transportation Department for instructions. The department will decide if the citation(s) can be cleared as a guest or if the ticket(s) should proceed with an appeal (decision based on the customer's account and citation violation).
